Unity in Christ

In the 17th Chapter of John, we heard these words of prayer spoken by Jesus to the Heavenly Father: "I ask not only on behalf of these (his disciples), but also on behalf of those **who will believe in me** through their word, **that they may all be one**. As you, Father are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, **so that the world may believe that you have sent me.**" (John 17: 20-21)

We live in a time where forces all around us are dividing, labeling, blaming, judging, and putting huge barriers between people. Political, social, and economic differences seem to be greater than I can ever recall in my lifetime. There continues to be great division and growing dissatisfaction among many people in our nation and world. How do we as followers of Jesus in such a tense time, respond to what is going on

around us?

I suggest that our response is to seek even deeper unity in Jesus Christ, the Savior of our individual lives and of the entire world. As believers, unity by our own efforts will always fall short. The only true unity is in the One who calls all people to Himself and embraces everyone in His saving love. Jesus prays for a unity of thought, action and purpose to exist among all believers and their Savior, and among themselves. Jesus' prayer for unity has a spiritual dimension that makes possible with the power of the Holy Spirit, a community of faith (the church) that is based on love of God and each other.

In his prayer to the Father, Jesus did not pray for us to be the same. His will was not that of uniformity. Rather, he prayed

that we would be one in purpose as the Father and the Son are one. The Christian call to unity does not mean giving up one's individuality. It is recognizing the oneness of love in Christ that brings us together in a bond of trust and cooperation solely because Jesus calls us into such a community.

The unity of the church becomes visible when we love one another. This is our witness of faith to the wider world. Unity is a gift from God through His Spirit. We need to be united in what or who we are for, and not in what or who we are against. True unity takes place when we all feel the need for one Savior (Jesus Christ), humbly submit to one God, experience that salvation, and share that saving love with each other, no matter what, on this journey of faith that we travel together.

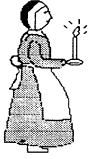
F.O.R.E. BOOK DRIVE

CHRISTMAS IN JULY OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD SHOEBOX MINISTRY

This year 2018 marks the 25th anniversary of Operation Christmas Child. During these 24 years 157 million children around the world in need have received shoebox gifts. We are proud to say that Fairview Moravian Church has been a part of this outreach ministry. Our member's response to this ministry through the years has been generous and uplifting.

We are excited to be a part of this ministry, by filling a shoebox with gifts for children who might not have received a gift at all. When they receive a shoebox, they are given the opportunity to learn Bible stories, memorize Scripture, and hear the Gospel giving their hearts to Jesus. These children in turn share the good news of Jesus Christ with their parents and siblings. The shoeboxes we fill help to sow seeds of Christianity in children.

Our kick-off date is August 5th. The shoeboxes will be available that Sunday morning after worship. The shoebox will include packing information and a list of suggested items. The rubber band in the box is to place around your box after you have filled it with gifts and the envelope containing the shipping cost.

This early start gives us the opportunity to shop the school sales that start around the middle of July through mid August. Early shopping will enable us to fill our shoeboxes and return by September 23.

Bring your completed box to church on any Sunday morning and place on one of the tables in the Parlor. We will store the shoeboxes securely until they are delivered to Pinedale Christian Church.

We would like for everyone to find a way to participate in this outreach ministry. You could fill shoeboxes, and invite your friends and relatives to participate. If you have difficulty shopping or just do not like to shop, we welcome monetary donations and someone will shop for you.

It is amazing what God can do with a shoebox filled with your gifts, in the transformation of hearts by the Christmas Child, who is the Savior of the World.

We ask for your prayers that God will direct each shoebox gift into the hands of the right child.

We give thanks for the love of Jesus Christ and know that we are blessed. May we commit ourselves to be a blessing to others?

In our effort to help those who are less fortunate than us, let work together to make our shoebox contributions in 2018 the best one ever.

Notes from Lewis

For Moravians, music has always been seen as a necessity of life, not as a luxury. The records kept by the early Moravian settlers in Forsyth County record the arrival of a shipment that included brass horns that were immediately put to use in the Bethabara community. Fairview continues the tradition of using instrumental music as a significant part of our worship experience. Our band here at Fairview is one of the most active groups in the church. For many years Burton Snyder served very faithfully as our band director. He and Anna did a lot to grow the band program here at Fairview. This leadership was continued by Melvin Fulp who directed the band for a while after Burton's death. Robah Ogburn provided very capable leadership for several years after this. We are very fortunate to now have Van Krause serving as our band director.

We have many people that have played in the band in the past that are not currently playing for one reason or another and we would like to see that change! Many Sundays when the band plays for worship we have more non church members than church members. We would also like to see more of our church members participate in the FREE band classes that are offered by the Salem Congregation at Home Moravian Church. These classes are taught on Tuesday evenings at 6:30, beginning on September 4th. The classes are taught by Robah Ogburn and Connie Merritt. Summary of our Board Meetings

Board of Elders

The Board of Elders also met June 11 and received reports from numerous church committees. The Christian Education Committee reported that \$450 was collected on Youth Sunday for Laurel Ridge; the Outreach and Special Events Committee reported the church calendar is filling up with weekend events in June, August, September, and October.

The weekend of September 7 and 8 will be busy with Police Appreciation Day, Back to Basics meeting, and a private party baby shower all scheduled that weekend. Fairview has building space to accommodate them all, but the Trustees will be asked to review cleanup responsibilities of our custodian and building renters to insure nothing is overlooked.

New Member Sunday is July 29, with at least two new members intending to join.

Joint Board

The Joint Boards of Fairview met June 11. In addition to other business, Scott read a letter from Rev. Don Griffin. In the letter, Don resigned his position as Visitation Pastor in order to assume more responsibility for the care of his family. Members of the Joint Board expressed appreciation for Don's tireless service.

Board of Trustees

The following are some of the more notable highlights of the most recent Trustees meeting: 1) Job descriptions of all church employees were reviewed with an eye toward adopting an annual review policy; (2) a policy of reviewing, monitoring, and reimbursement of all credit transactions involving church credit cards was adopted; (3) any purchases of \$500 or more must first have prior trustee approval. (4) it was noted that our revenue was down by approximately \$34,000 for the year, making a transfer from a reserve account to the operating account necessary; (5) New provincial share policy was discussed, noting that the PEC share could be as high as 18 % or as low as 10 % depending on a point assessment based on annual attendance, income, prior relief granted, frequency of meeting share obligations, and reserve transfers; (6) the proposed stage in the activity area has been delayed as a result of unforeseen problems. Hopefully, a private contractor will be brought in to complete the project. (7) Rev. Lasley will take over the Jesus Followers.

Joint Board Gives Provincial Synod Summary Report

On Sunday, May 27, 2018, a Provincial Synod Summary Report was given to the congregation by the Fairview Joint Board during the worship service. Melissa Thompson, a Synod delegate and Trustee, read the report on behalf of the Joint Board. The report detailed a number of the actions of Synod including the election of Bishops, PEC elections, and the election of our Associate Pastor, Rev. Victoria Lasley, to the Salem College Board of Trustees. The report also highlighted several resolutions including the themes of (1) Full Communion with the United Methodist Church; (2) Laurel Ridge Capital Campaign; (3) Provincial Share Methodology; (4) Mutual Respect and Acceptance; and (5) Leadership Roles and Diversity of Views. The Joint Board discussed and responded to several of these resolutions at its April 29th meeting as detailed in the Summary Report. The report is available in the Church Office for anyone who would like a copy.

September Mission Program - Come Hear About Cuba

The Moravian Mission work continues to grow in the nation of Cuba ! We will hear the latest update on SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 23 when JOE JARVIS will give a presentation during the Sunday School hour. HAPPY ONE HUNDRED, EVELYN

I grew up at Fairview but left in the early 1960s and was away for over four decades. Sixteen years ago, I finally returned for a Sunday morning worship service. As I walked into the sanctuary and headed down the center aisle, I began to look around for familiar faces. I saw many in the choir but not so many in the congregation. Then I saw her smiling face. She was sitting near the back of the church where she still sits today. I went over, and she invited me to sit with her, and I have been there ever since. I call her my church mother.

Evelyn Bessie Wright (Whitney) West turned one hundred years old on June 4th. Amazingly, Evelyn looks at least thirty maybe forty years younger than she really is. In fact, to me, she doesn't look much older than she looked back when I was a child. Her typical response to such compliments is, "you better get your eyes checked." At any rate, Evelyn says she has known me since my mother, Pearl, was pregnant with me.

Now, some sixteen years after returning to Fairview, I still sit with Evelyn. There are several things you can count on if you are anywhere near her in church. First, she is going to make sure you sign the register at the end of the pew. If you don't, you're in trouble. Secondly, almost always, she passes some form of candy around to everyone near her. Thirdly, when there is a Love Feast, she makes sure you have a napkin, if you don't, she will come up with one for you.

Evelyn and her seven siblings were born to Burgess McAger Wright and Bessie Reynolds Wright. Her brother, Bill, married Helen Michael, who we all remember and adored. Ms. Helen died just a few years ago at almost 103 years old. Bill and Helen were the parents of our own Cynthia Wright Faircloth; Katina Wright Phillips, our head usher, Bill Wright; and the late Gene Wright. Evelyn's other siblings include our own E. Artis Wright Weber and Doris Gray (DG) Wright Noell along with brother, Bynum Wright, who lives in Florida. Another brother, Woody, is now deceased along with two other sisters, Violet Catherine and Clara Lucille, both of whom died at an early age.

I recently spent much of an afternoon interviewing Evelyn, and as usual, we had a fantastic time, chatting and gossiping about everything under the sun. Mostly, however, we talked about Fairview and all the people who helped to make our church great.

Evelyn grew up at 1229 Twenty First Street, which was in a neighborhood filled with children and was fertile for recruitment for Fairview Moravian Church. As it turned out, a multitude of families from this and the surrounding neighborhoods helped form the base for the enormous growth of Fairview in the mid-twentieth century. Most of the families in the area would walk to Fairview, coming in large numbers from neighborhoods near Liberty Street and the Bon Air area.

As we chatted, Evelyn and I put our combined 173 years of memories together as we tried to recall some of the many families from way back then. We couldn't remember everyone, but we came up with a partial list of some of these families. They include: The Adams, the Andrews, the Barnes, the Bennetts, the Blantons, the Blums, the Brames, the Bransons, the Burgers, the Byerlys, the Callows, the Cobbs, the Crutchfields, the Cummings, the Davis's, the Dents, the Dull's, the Elams, the Eubanks, the Fausts, the Fergusons, the Forkners, the Fraziers, the Gerners, the Haleys, the Hecks, the Hubbards, the Joyces, the Lawrences, the Kinneys, the Knights, the Linebacks, the Manuals, the McGees, the Morgans, the Newsomes, the Oakeys, the Oehmans, the Pages, the Penrys, the Pulliams, the Reichs, the Rascoes, the Sheltons, the Snyders, the Southernns, the Speases, the Stiths, the Styers, the Tises, the Tuttles, the Van Hoys, the Van Horns, the Warrens, the Webers, the Wests, the Williams, the Yarboroughs, the Ziglars and the list of pioneers goes on and on. I know we missed some and I apologize. Nevertheless, this shows that it took a village of good, dedicated folks to build a church like Fairview.

Evelyn showed me certificates, attesting to her being christened at Fairview on December 24, 1918 when she was seven months old by Reverend Leon G. Luckenbach. Another certificate shows that in 1923, she was promoted from the Cradle Roll to the Beginners Department of the church Sunday school. She recalls that at first she balked at going up to the Beginners Department, stubbornly preferring to be with her daddy in the Men's Bible Class. She went with her daddy there so many times they declared her their mascot. Finally, however, she was persuaded to turn loose of her daddy's coattail and go on to the Beginners Department. In 1930, she was promoted to the Intermediate Class. She recalls having a wonderful time throughout her Sunday school days. She also loved going to Vacation Bible School, which back then was two weeks in length. The midweek prayer service in those days was on Thursday night, and she went to that also.

Evelyn recalls with great affection, the Reverend Christian Otto Weber who was at Fairview from 1928 until 1940. Also, she has a vivid memory of his young wife, Dorothy, the vision of whom still deeply imprinted in Evelyn's mind to this very

day. She can still see young Dorothy Weber, pregnant with third son Bruce. Dorothy was sitting in a chair, and her middle son, Chris, was in her lap and her oldest son, Herbert, was standing beside her. Then just six weeks after baby Bruce was born, Dorothy suddenly died. "It was such a shock to us all!" Evelyn lamented. "Dorothy was so beautiful, and it was so sad."

Later, Evelyn recalls the great Reverend Weber teaching Sunday school and even surprising the young Sunday schoolers by giving them pop tests on the Sunday school lesson. She also would never forget a time when Rev. Weber had to call her and my sister, Mary Jane Ferguson, down for running around the church, making too much noise.

Evelyn and I talked about the choir. She sang in the junior choir but never in the Chapel Choir. The earliest Junior Choir director she recalls was a Ms. Daniels and her sister. This was back when Evelyn was about 8 or 9 years old. Evelyn remembers having to sing a solo, and being so scared that her knees were trembling. Later, Evelyn's sister, E. Artis, became the choir director and continued in that role for 20 or so years. The Chapel Choir directors were Paul Pegram, Betty Barnes, Doug Kimel and Richard Rierson. Evelyn also participated in the teenage circle group, headed by Eunice Lineback and Aunt Judy Barnes. (On a side note, back in the day, it seemed like every other person at Fairview was a Barnes.)

On October 12, 1930, Evelyn was confirmed by Reverend Weber and Bishop Edward Ronthaler. Evelyn graduated from Reynolds High School and several years later she married Hoyt Whitney who became the owner of the very successful Whitney Furniture Store in Winston Salem.

Evelyn and Hoyt were married for 43 years and had two beautiful daughters: The oldest is Ann Whitney Marcus who is married to David Marcus. They have a daughter and a son. Their daughter is Dr. Elizabeth (Buff) Long who is a college professor. Buff and her husband Mark have an eleven year old daughter, Crosby, who is Evelyn's great granddaughter. David and Ann Marcus's son is Reverend David Marcus, who is the minister at Christ Moravian Church in Winston Salem. He and wife, Lee, have a son, eleven year old David Alan Marcus III (Evelyn's great grandson.

Evelyn's younger daughter is Susan Whitney Crump who is a retired school teacher. She had one son, Reeves Crump, who lived in Boone, NC, however, sadly, Reeves recently passed away. Evelyn says that Reeves was one of the nicest, sweetest young men she has ever known, and she and her entire family will always miss him greatly. Reeves is survived by his wonderful wife, Pamela, and their beautiful daughter, thirteen-year-old Sophia, (Evelyn's great granddaughter.)

Evelyn and Hoyt had a good marriage, a good life, and great children, but sadly, Hoyt, passed away a number of years ago at the relatively young age of sixty one. Sometime later, Evelyn married David West, who ironically, had lived beside her back when she was a child on Twenty First Street. Coincidentally, David West was our own Anna Francis Morgan Dull's and the late Richard Morgan's uncle. Anna Francis and Richard's mother, Bonnie, was David West's sister. Small world, isn't it?

Despite her years, Evelyn is quite mobile and remains very active and independent. She lives in her own home and is able to take care of her own needs. She still drives wherever she needs to go although she does have a walker, which she doesn't think she really needs.

Evelyn says that Fairview has always been her life and being a cradled Fairview Moravian has always been one of her greatest of God's blessings. "I love going to church, and the people there are like my extended family!" she says enthusiastically. Weather permitting, she is in church almost every Sunday, always wearing a pretty smile and dressed to the nines. She is quite a lady!

For the past 16 years, Evelyn has always saved me a seat beside her in church. Each time I sit with her we usually whisper back and forth, sometimes too loud, but nevertheless, she always inspires me and makes me feel like a better person. I love my church mother very much and am so grateful to her for befriending me when I first came back to Fairview. Also, Evelyn, please know that everyone at Fairview loves you very much and are so very grateful for your hundred years of devotion to our church and to the Lord Jesus Christ. WE WISH YOU A HAPPY BIRTHDAY, AND MANY MORE! And, we pray, that God will always be with you and bless you forever!

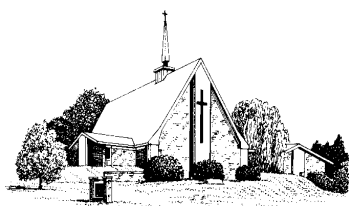
