For our Wednesday noon Bible Study on 1 John, I recently showed a video of part of my wedding in 1984. It was the homily given by Father Henri Nouwen on "God's First Love." Nouwen read from 1 John 4 which concludes:

18 There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. 19 We love because he first loved us. 20 Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, [c] are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. 21 The

commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also. (NRSV)

The NT Greek word for "perfection" carries the meaning of "completion" or "fulfillment." The context of 1 John is a call to a life commitment to be growing into complete trust ("abiding") in Divine love which vanquishes our human tendency to become "stuck" in fear. The Gospel message is that abiding in the Spirit of Christ sets us free from the power of external and internalized fear-mongering. Selective fear in the face of immediate danger is a Divine gift.

"Abiding" in chronic fear is the work of evil. In Christ, no fear has dominion over our soul.

As we enter the call process at Fairview (see Marshall Mathers' announcement), God invites us as a congregation to grow into complete trust of God's infinite love revealed in Christ Jesus. 1 Corinthians 13 describes characteristics and signs of Christ's love in our lives. In an age of fear-mongering and undisciplined venting and outrage, this is counter-cultural. It requires deep, Grace-filled, trust in one another. We are not called to be perfect, but to humbly seek a shared level of disciplined, fear-vanquishing faith

that comes from the "first love" of God alone. May it be so.

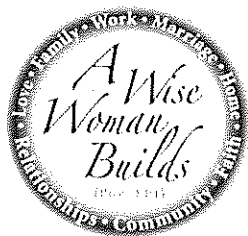

Notes From Lewis

From childhood, we see pictures of Thanksgiving: Pilgrims dressed in black with big buckles and wide-brimmed hats sharing a bountiful feast with friendly Indians. This took place in Plymouth Colony, in present-day Massachusetts, in 1621. The lesson that many of us were taught as school children is that the Indians shared their food and the Pilgrims shared their God. And they all lived happily ever after. Obviously, we know that not to be true. That day (actually it was three days of feasting and games) did happen, but the Pilgrims and Indians didn't continue to live in harmony for long. And the first Thanksgiving didn't continue on to become the national holiday it is today until more than 200 years later.

Historians argue many things when it comes to Thanksgiving. Some say the first true Thanksgiving in America took place in May 1541 when Spanish explorer Francisco Vasquez de Coronado led 1,500 of his

men in a Thanksgiving celebration in what is present-day Texas. Coronado's expedition had traveled north from Mexico City in search of gold. The Texas Society Daughters of the American Colonists commemorated the event as the first Thanksgiving in 1959.

Many historians believe we have a journalist to thank for our modern-day Thanksgiving more so than the Pilgrims. The Library of Congress, with its timeline on Thanksgiving, credits Sarah Hale, the editor of Godey's Lady Book and Magazine, with finally convincing President Abraham Lincoln to make it a national holiday through endless promotion in her magazine and, later, with a direct letter-writing campaign. Hale, who felt the country needed a day that would unite Americans in common purpose and values, even convinced her readers to petition to Lincoln.

Just after the Union troops won the battle of Gettysburg in

1863, Lincoln asked the country to repent "our national perverseness and disobedience" to God during the Civil War. He wrote to "fervently implore the interposition of the almighty hand to heal the wounds of the nation." So, President Lincoln set the stage for Thanksgiving becoming a national holiday, but Congress didn't make it official until 1941.

Today, Thanksgiving seems to be more about feasting and football and gearing up for Black Friday, the biggest shopping day of the year, than it does about thanking God for our blessings. This Thanksgiving let us not forget to gratefully acknowledge God's goodness to us. This Thanksgiving let our prayers and expressions of love rise toward our Heavenly Father.

Rejoice always; pray without ceasing; in everything give thanks, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18).

"Over the River and Through the Woods.....at Lazy 5 Ranch We Went"

The September 2019 Adventure of Fairview Senior Friends by Nancy Morgan

It was an "almost Fall" day with a cool start and rising temperatures. At 9:30 am, seven seniors boarded our church bus for a trip to Mooresville, NC. We'd booked a wagon ride at the "Lazy 5 Ranch". Most of us had never visited the ranch. But several had and lively conversation began.

The "Lazy 5 Ranch" is privately owned and operated by Henry Hampton. He gets no federal or state funding. All of his animals are ear-tagged and registered with the USDA which conducts yearly inspections. Mr. Hampton has been raising exotic animals for over 35 years and owns thousands of acres of rolling Piedmont land to accommodate them. Years ago, he created an educational and entertaining way to share his passion with others: Yes, it's the "Lazy 5 Ranch" which offers more than a zoo. It's (*literally*) a "hands-on" experience without animal cages and restraints, in most cases.

Long before we were "back at the ranch", GPS reported that the drive from Winston-Salem to Mooresville was only 45 minutes. Our wagon ride was at 12:45 pm. So, with plenty of time to spare, we detoured for a surprise stop at Ketchie Creek Bakery in Mocksville. It's been said: "Life is short; eat dessert first". So, we did!

After cake and coffee, we resumed our journey with game time on the bus. The game was "How Well Do You Know Your Animals?" Each person was given pad and pen. I donned my portable microphone and read easy riddles about 20 different animals. They (*the people, not the animals*) were asked to write down the name of each animal described in the riddle. The one (*again, the person, not the animal*) who got the most correct answers won a prize. Surprisingly, everyone won!

Meanwhile, (*still not "back at the ranch" yet*) Lewis was driving a back road between Mocksville and Mooresville, using GPS to locate the "Lazy 5 Ranch". We were almost on the right road several times, but GPS told us to look on the wrong side of the road for the entrance. After going too far, we circled back for a second try, and then a third, maybe a fourth. Suddenly we spotted two school buses parked "a-ways back" on spacious, farm-like property. Cautiously, we turned onto the first dirt road we found and headed towards the buses. We came to an arched sign with massive cow horns that assured us we were on "Lazy 5" property. Ahead was a big, barn-like building. We spotted a door labeled "Office." Lewis parked the bus and a few of us entered the door to register. What we found was shocking! Not an office, but a good-sized kitchen, an impressive spread of homecooked vittles, and a small group of staff finishing lunch. Needless to say, they were equally shocked to see us! We explained that we were taking the 12:45 wagon ride. In turn, they told us we needed to go around the corner of the building to check-in. So, we climbed back on the bus and drove around the building, ready to check-in. We found horses, wagons, and people waiting, but no pay window. In desperation, we drove toward a dirt parking lot. There, at the ranch entrance, was a ticket booth. (*Oh, no!*) We'd entered through the back gate! (*Now, that explains why staff in the kitchen looked so confused.*)

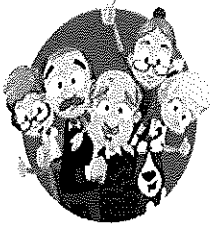

Finally, tickets were purchased. We back-tracked to the barn structure, petted horses, and waited for our boarding call. Finally, we climbed onto our private, horse-drawn, sightseeing wagon. The wagon was a sturdy vehicle with three long benches and iron railings. Each of us received a generous bucket of feed. Our guide told us how excited the animals would be when they saw us. She told us how to drop feed into the mouths of impatient zebras, buffalo, cattle, sheep, antelope, goats, and llamas. She warned: Drop feed into their noses and expect a nasty shower in return. She said that ostriches, blue emu, and other exotic birds would quickly poke their heads in/out of our feed buckets. She warned: Zebra were the only animals on the ranch with top and bottom teeth. So, they could bite. And, if we fed the zebras, they would follow the wagon on the 3.5-mile trail. (*Oops! We did and they did! That is, follow us, not bite.*)

The wagon stopped often along the trail. That's when we learned about animals and saw them in natural habitat. Domestic and exotic deer, sheep, antelope, and goats seemed used to being interrupted by animated humans pointing fingers at them from a wagon. Also, that's when zebra, antelope, and goats climbed aboard, begging for handouts. The zebras were persistent, poking their heads through the railings, eating feed dropped on the floor of the wagon around our feet, and prodding us to hand over more! Watusi cattle with monstrous horns stared at us from their resting places but red, Scotch Highland cattle came closer. The emu, with its purple head, "strutted its stuff". Dromedary camels, llamas, fowl and pot-bellied pigs and their piglets dotted the landscape. Buffalo rolled in the cool mud on the creek bank and one curious buffalo rubbed off on Lewis while visiting our wagon. (*A wet wipe was insufficient. So, Lewis looked forward to the "Washing Station" at the end of the trail.*)

The wagon stop at the giraffe enclosure was the highlight of our day! Several giraffes lowered their heads over a high, chain link fence and stuck their 20-inch tongues straight into our feed buckets! They were as persistent as the zebras! While stopped, I had my back to their enclosure when suddenly I was aware that the long, spotted head of a yellow giraffe was almost laying on my shoulder. (*They try anything to get to the feed bucket.*) When I turned my head, I was eye-to-eye with that giraffe, looking into his/her alluring dark eyes outlined by mascara-thick, black lashes. That encounter was just a little too close for my comfort!

The end of our one-hour wagon ride was at the end of the dusty trail. We cheered the unexpected pleasure of the day. We'd seen God's creation in over 750 animals from six continents who freely co-existed on the same land. We'd learned they roamed freely and through their wandering presence, changed the landscape daily. We'd learned about their special behaviors, native environments, appetites, body structure, and ranch terrains.

We'd been amused by gentle, social beasts who were very intimidating at first. We'd been "where the buffalo roam and the deer and the antelope play." We'd become "bosom buddies" with bison, zebras, ostriches, pygmy goats, and other domestic and exotic animals. We'd rubbed elbows (*and other body parts*) with friendly creatures great and small. We'd fed them, aside from their daily diet of hay and feed, and dropped food into their wide, open mouths. We'd seen strong teeth and long tongues up close, really close. We'd been rewarded with slobbery hand kisses by animals who loved social interaction. We'd touched their coats and feathers and uncomfortably, seen them react normally when "nature called". In fact, someone asked our guide: "Who cleans up all those droppings at day's end? She replied: "Nobody. We leave them to enrich the soil."

After the ride, we hastily made our way to the outdoor "Washing Station." We lathered with enough soap for a shower, only to find water pipes barely drizzling enough to fill a thimble. But we did our best to "wash up" with the water we were given. Then, someone read the posted instructions. True to ranch life, it said: "Pull the ring at the end of the chain to activate the pump to produce more water". Some of us took a second dip in the spring.

What an enjoyable adventure! And, surely one we'll repeat in the near future. (*And, we'll take more wet wipes.*)

Joint Board Update

First, both Boards have decided to reduce their numbers. The Board of Trustees consists of nine lay members. Beginning in 2020, the Board of Trustees will consist of seven lay members.

The Board of Elders consists of eight lay members in addition to the Pastor, who serves as chairman. Beginning in 2020, the Board of Elders will consist of seven lay members plus the Pastor.

These changes are in keeping with Fair-

view's Policy and Procedures Manual, which provides that each Board will consist of six to twelve members. The number is not fixed. These changes are expected to have no effect on day-to-day church operations, although you will notice the difference when you vote for new officers at Church Council on November 17.

Second, the Joint Boards have voted unanimously to begin the Call Process for a new Pastor immediately. The Joint Boards will meet with David Guthrie, Chairman of the Provincial Elders Conference, as early as this

week, but no later than the following week, to begin this process.

By way of explanation, the Joint Boards voted at the end of 2018, to accept the PEC recommendation that we go through a transitional process that would allow us to consider who we are as a church and whom we are seeking as a pastor. For a while, despite all that has happened this year, it appeared we could complete the process in a timely manner. Now, however, we know we are falling behind our schedule and we really need to move forward.

Therefore, as we complete the last couple months of our transition process, we will also be engaged in the call process. The two will be conducted simultaneously. There will be a couple more sessions in the transition process asking the congregation to participate and give feedback, but at the same time the Joint Boards will be working with the PEC to consider candidates for call. If you have questions or concerns about either of these announcements, please talk to me, talk to Jeff, or to any Board member.

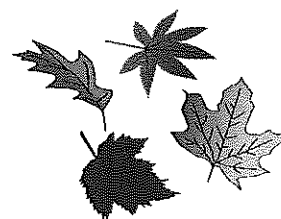
