Jesus Christ, Our Good Shepherd

In our Wednesday lunch and Bible Study, we have been learning a lot about Jesus as the Good Shepherd. We have gained new understanding in our study of John, Chapter 10 through the resource of a book entitled: A Shepherd Looks at the Good Shepherd by author Philip Keller. Keller writes from his experience as a shepherd and applies those insights to being "sheep" and disciples of Jesus today.

In a recent Bible Study, we focused on John, chapter 10, verse 3 where Jesus says: "The sheep hear his (the shepherd's) voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out." Keller helped us to see that the relationship between a shepherd and the sheep is strongly dependent on the use of the shepherd's voice.

Sheep quickly become accustomed to the owner's particular voice. They know that when the shepherd calls them, it is for a special purpose that has their best interests in mind. The shepherd even has names for each sheep that are recognized by the sheep when their name is called. If a stranger tries to call the sheep, the sheep will not respond because they will only go to their rightful shepherd owner, whose voice they recognize.


With this in mind, we can see a number of parallels in living the Christian life. Jesus, the Good Shepherd, calls us as His sheep, to come to Him. We know that when He calls us, He has our best interests in mind. We listen for his voice as he speaks through the Scriptures, especially the words and actions of Jesus; through a sermon or presentation; through a time of quiet devotion; through a

family member, friend, or neighbor; through the beauty and splendor of God's creation; through an inner voice speaking to us guided by the Holy Spirit.

Other voices, other influences, vie for our attention and devotion and can drown out the voice of the Good Shepherd. To hear His voice, it is so important to stay in close relationship with the Savior through prayer, reflection, Scripture study, and listening daily for His voice. God is continually calling us into a broader, richer experience of His will for our lives. His intentions for us are always good!!!





Betty and Danny Ferguson

I have some bad news. Danny Ferguson is leaving us. Even worse news, Betty is going with him. They're moving to Charleston, S.C. to be near their family. I understand, sort of. I'm going to miss them both, almost as much as they'll miss Fairview and all their friends here. Danny has been associated with Fairview, off and on, ever since he was three years old and voted Fairview's prettiest baby. It's true.

Betty has been at Fairview, with Danny, for over fifteen years, in several different capacities: church member, choir member, worker behind the scenes, technically, and generally helping out with anything that's needed. It's been hard for Danny to say no to anything at Fairview, since he lives a "stone's throw" from the church. He can't use, "My car's in the shop" or, "There's snow in my driveway." Nope... not when he's within walking distance, but, he wouldn't even if he could. He's always available. Fairview is going to miss them both.

Danny is from Winston-Salem and I found out he had a sister twenty-three years older than him with no other siblings in-between. He won the Safety Patrol Award in grade school and then graduated from RJ Reynolds High School. He went to East Carolina University and took advantage of the collegelife opportunities there. After graduation in 1969, he chose to attend law school at Memphis State University, where he graduated 4th in his class, earning his Juris Doctor Degree. He lived in Memphis for over ten years before coming back home. While practicing law in Memphis, he was honing his skills in the daily duties that all young lawyers go through doing a lot of night work at times. One night, Elvis Presley's cousin had been locked up for something and Elvis came to bail him out—Elvis himself! And guess what? Danny was off that night.

Betty is from Hampton, Virginia where she grew up in a home with two sisters, 14 and 15 years older than her. Her mother lived to be 99 years and 11 months old. Can you believe that? She went to Old Dominion University and got her Master's Degree from Virginia Commonwealth University. She's been in education for 40 years, 23 of them teaching music. She has that gift—no other way to explain it. She was born with music in her and has influenced students throughout her life. One in particular, who made it big with famous bands, still writes her and sends her music and videos he has produced. She had that kind of influence on him. They both love to travel, especially to Italy and the beach, and Betty can speak enough Italian to get them through most toll lines on the Italian freeways!

They met in 1990 on a blind date in Newport News, Virginia and married about two years later. Danny brought his bride to Winston-Salem and now they're leaving us, which means between them, we will be losing forty-seven years of practicing law, over 40 years of teaching, church committees, recitals, author of two books (VOW OF VENGEANCE and THE TITANIC ATONEMENT), and friends to us all at Fairview. That's a big hole to fill.

I was visiting with them recently and they were telling me some stories from their lives . . . very interesting and entertaining. They were in London once and met a Baroness who set up a lunch for them at Parliament. Then they saw the Queen and Nelson Mandela ride by in a parade—with pictures to prove it. They bought a second home one time in the coastal city of Bath, N.C. and kept it for over five years. We've all dreamed of doing something like that. They did it.

Their travels have taken them to France as well, where they really enjoyed the Normandy region partly because of Danny's interest in history and WWII. Some of that may have stemmed from Danny's service in the United States Marine Reserves, which he was a member of from 1964 until 1970—active duty in 1964 and 1965. I guess his experience with firearms helped him at the Lewisville American Legion Post, where he and his good friend, Bill Wright, served on the Rifle Team.

Danny has tried hundreds upon hundreds of criminal cases over the years, from misdemeanors to capital felonies. He has tried cases in numerous trial courts in North Carolina and Tennessee as well as in the NC Court of Appeals. He has filed numerous pleadings for Certiorari in the US Supreme Court. Hearing him describe the feeling he had in these capital cases, where his defense literally meant the difference between life and death, was spell-binding. I can't imagine having that type of responsibility thrust upon me.

His work was, and is still, very important to Danny—as well it should be. It will always be a huge part of his life. However, when I asked him what was most important to him (besides the obvious answer we'd all give—family), he told me this: "I feel so fortunate and blessed that my parents, Hardie Tom and Pearl Brown Ferguson, raised their children in the church." He then told me that he felt sorry for those out there that didn't have that, and don't have the love of the Lord in their lives. Betty told me how Fairview reminds her of the church where she grew up. What a nice memory to have.

I tried to get something else out of Danny, but being the shy, reserved type that he is, he didn't want to say too much about himself. He only said that he wished everyone could be as happy and content as he is, and that everyone could believe, as he does, that God will always be with him.

Betty is very excited to start the new adventure in their lives, close to their son and three grandchildren. She's hoping to help influence their lives musically, as only a grandmother and teacher could. She's also hoping that some songs she's been working on can get copyrighted. I'd love to hear them. But most of all, she hopes her child and grandchildren will have a happy, fortunate, and blessed life. Don't we all?

I have a LONG list of Danny's professional achievements—more than will fit in this short, little narrative. But, trust me, it is full of impressive awards and honors. I'm proud to know them both, and sad that we'll be losing them to their new life in South Carolina. But trust me, Danny, anytime you want to come back and visit and resume your duties as Diener, Trustee Representative, Safety Committee member, van driver, choir member, or any other things you've done over the years—just let us know. We'd love to welcome back Betty and Fairview's "Prettiest Baby" one more time!


