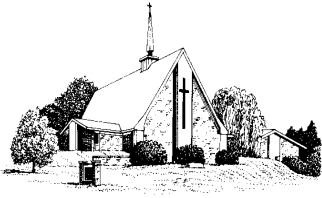

## Dorcas and Ken Hauser

The odds against one of our favorite Fairview couples ever meeting, much less marrying, was incredible. After all, Ken was a farm boy from Iowa, and Dorcas was the daughter of a well-known principal at Mineral Springs High School in far off Winston Salem. Clearly, as you will soon see, God's great hand took control and made it all happen.

Kenneth Frank Hauser was from Doon, Iowa and grew up on the family farm. Ken's mother was Esther Oakland (previously Egeland), whose predecessors were from Haeglestad, Norway. Back in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century, when the Oaklands arrived in America, they secured 160 acres of Iowa farm land through a homestead grant, and the family still possesses the original homestead certificate today. Through hard work, the farm grew to be 600 acre.

Ken, along with his three brothers and three sisters grew up on the farm and helped to tend it. Ken even helped their father breed and break horses and mules on the farm. At the same time, Ken attended Richland #6 grade school, a one room schoolhouse, and thereafter, Inwood High School in Lyon County, Iowa, graduating in 1956.

In the meantime, Dorcas Imogene White, the only child of Hugh and Mabel White, lived in the Winston Salem area. Hugh White was the renowned and much admired principal of Mineral Springs High School for 41 years. Similarly, Dorcas's mother, Mabel, taught 7<sup>th</sup> and 8th grade history at Mineral Springs and was well liked and held in high esteem by her students. (Mabel even taught Fairview's very own Ruth Reich.) In 1955, upon graduation from high school, Dorcas attended Guilford College, receiving her BS degree in 1959, then, she went on to earn her master's degree from UNC - Chapel Hill. After college, she landed a job at Walkertown High School where she taught English.

After high school, Ken's father decided to move back to East Bend, N.C, where he had once lived. He brought Mom Hauser, along with Ken and Ken's sister, Carol, leaving five older siblings back in Iowa. Ken enjoyed his time in East Bend, getting to know his relatives better and even helped to renovate his aunt's house, but education was a priority, so Ken applied to Appalachian State Teacher's College in Boone and was accepted. Working at R.J. Reynolds Tobacco in the summers to pay his tuition, finally after four years, he received a degree in math and social studies. Fortuitously, he was assigned to practice teach at Walkertown High School, where - *low and behold* - our own Dorcas White was a teacher.

One of Dorcas's associates told her about the new, "good looking" practice teacher, and said, "Here's a picture of him. I might have found you a man!"

Well, somehow, the wheels started turning, and Ken slyly asked Dorcas to help proof read a report, but when Dorcas completed her review, the report had so many red marks that it looked like a wounded warrior. Despite that, however, as time passed, Ken concluded that Dorcas was a "*right nice woman*," (those were Ken's words), and decided that he wanted to get to know her better.

After practice teaching was over, Ken went to work at R.J. Reynolds Tobacco, but was on the verge of moving to Baltimore to take a better job, when the fickle finger of fate – most likely guided by God – changed Ken's life. Out of the blue, he got the dreaded letter from his Iowa draft board, ordering him to report for induction. Now, he would not take the new job in Maryland, but instead, he had to dutifully report to Fort Jackson for basic training. Thereafter, he was sent to the Chemical Corp at Edgewood Arsenal, Maryland, but all the while, he was staying in touch with Dorcas. Finally, he ended up at the Army base in Anniston, Alabama, which happened to be the home of the Womens Army Corp (WACS). The record is silent as to whether this was a factor that caused Dorcas to rush things up, but nevertheless, the upcoming June of 1963, Ken and Dorcas were married at the Winston Salem Friends Church. *The Lord works in mysterious ways!*

Now back in Anniston, Alabama, the newly-weds set up housekeeping, but Dorcas was not impressed with the accommodations and remembers the gas stove that you had to light with a match, blowing up in her face and burning her eye lashes off.

Finally, to everyone's relief, Ken went to reserve status, and the young couple returned to Winston Salem and rented a house off Linville Road near Salem Lake. At first they both taught at East Forsyth High School, but a while later, Ken went to work for Hanes Hosiery (later re-named Sara Lee) where he was foreman of the stamp and fold department, then later changed to the cost accounting department, which managed the accounting for five plants, turning out 500,000 dozen hose per week.

In December of 1965, Ken and Dorcas's first child, Daniel, was born. Daniel is all grown up now and works for Wells Fargo. He and wife, Tammy, live in Concord, N.C., and have a son, Will, who just graduated from Appalachian and is headed to graduate school.

In November of 1968, their second son, Samuel, was born. Samuel is now a Senior Financial Director at Krispy Kreme and his wife, Kathryn, is an English teacher at the Career Center. They have two children: Seth, a graduate of UNC who works in Charlotte and Jacob who is a special child and attends Carter High School.

It was on a blessed day in 1972 when Ken, Dorcas and family were out in search of a church to call home. They had been Quaker but were ready for a change. One Sunday morning they turned onto Silas Creek Parkway, where there is a line of at least four churches of various denominations. Fortunately for us, Fairview was their first stop, but when they arrived, it was almost 11 am and as we all have long known, Fairview worship has always started at 10 am. So, they missed Worship but ended up in Young Adult's Sunday school class, where Bob Van Horn, who Dorcas had known from Mineral Springs, was the teacher. Young Sam went to the Sunday school class led by Edith Tuttle, and young Daniel went to the class led by Sondra Branson Goforth. The entire family all loved it, and by the time they met Reverend Vernon Daetwyler, they were hooked and have been devoted members at Fairview ever since.

Ken and Dorcas have been extremely active in the growth of Fairview. Over the years, Ken has served many times as an elder and also as a trustee, including being the chairman.

Earlier, in 1996, Fairview's legendary fix-it engineer, Raymer Faust, Juanita's brother-in-law, was anxious to find someone besides himself to know how to do all of the essential operational tasks around the church. So, he recruited Ken to help with the Christmas candles, the Star, the Christmas tree, and so many other things that required special knowledge and skill to do. With Raymer as his teacher, Ken studied, photographed and even created a detailed, how-to- do- it notebook on the church facility. Then, almost like the great Raymer Faust was content to know that when he was gone, his church would be in good hands, in June of 1997, he passed away. Sadly, Ken had lost his mentor.

At this point in Ken's life, he had been at Sara Lee for 31 years and had had a long and successful career. In fact, maybe too successful, because the new computer inventory system that he helped implement worked so well that Ken's very own job was no longer needed. Abruptly, he found himself, having to take early retirement, which left him scratching his head and thinking, first Raymer, now my job. What am I going to do with myself -after all, I am just 59 years old? It seemed like there was a big empty hole in his life.

Thinking and praying about his dilemma, it finally hit between the eyes like ton of bricks when suddenly, he concluded, *the good Lord had already answered my question*. The words had come from Raymer but they were God's words. Raymer had prepared him, and God was directing him to be a steward of things at Fairview. And that's exactly what Ken did, and is still doing some 21 years later, and with each successive year, both he and Dorcas continue to become closer and closer to our dear Lord.

To Ken and Dorcas, stewardship included many other things at the church, including helping with the preschool program, where daughter-in-law, Kathryn served as director. On top of that, they help with the chicken pies and served on cooking teams. Ken is a master candle maker, he's been a leader in the Men's Fellowship; he still directs two yard sales a year. He heads the group that decorates the church at Christmas and still climbs the very high ladder in the sanctuary to put up the Moravian Star. Basically, around the church, Ken is the go-to guy who can do anything.

With all that, Ken and Dorcas are integral members of the Chancel Choir and seldom miss a practice. Dorcas is as energetic as Ken in her church activities. She is a wonderful speaker and my favorite at Fairview, and she also has taught the Weber Class both at Laurel Ridge and at the church. Furthermore, she has been on a cooking team and been Ken's companion in their myriad of church endeavors. Also, Dorcas works hard at a unique way of promoting our church by making small folded stars and giving them out to the public along with information about Fairview.

Perhaps, Ken and Dorcas's greatest calling, however, is their devotion to their grandchild, Jacob, which they call a labor of love. Of course, they love all of their grandchildren immensely, but young Jacob needs more attention than most children. They often bring him to Fairview where he interacts with the congregation, the ministers, the staff, and with his best friend, our very own, Lewis Phillips.

Over the years, despite all of their church activity, Ken and Dorcas have found the time to see the world, including all fifty states, plus Australia, New Zealand, and Europe. In Russia, they dined with Russian families and took a river cruise on the Volga. Ken even caught a Russian fish on the Volga. Some of their travel companions were Fairview folks, like Hewitt and Jessie Gilbert, Evelyn and David West, Lucy and Benny Milliken, Walter and Edith Tuttle, Cleo and Jake Weems, Ruth and Everett Freeman, John and Sandra Goforth and others.

Ken is an avid gardener which is obvious when you see his yard. Also, he loves golf and plays every week or so with his Fairview golf buddies, including national seniors champion, Lindsay Tise and other great Fairview Moravians like Eddie Hubbard and Jerry Byerly.

I asked Ken and Dorcas what Fairview has meant to them. They both responded enthusiastically, almost in unison, exclaiming, "It saved us! It's our church home! Fairview has always been so friendly. Our children fitted it perfectly. People like youth director, Don Griffin, helped to shape our sons' lives and people like Bob Rascoe and practically everyone at Fairview were always so very cordial and ready to help us in every way. It has made a huge difference in our lives. We love Fairview! "

Well, Ken and Dorcas, Fairview loves you all too! From the depth of our hearts, we appreciate your dedication to our church. Through your love of family, church, country and Jesus Christ, you both have been role models to everyone you have come in contact with. Thank you for being the wonderful stewards and great Christians that you are and may God be with you and bless you forever.

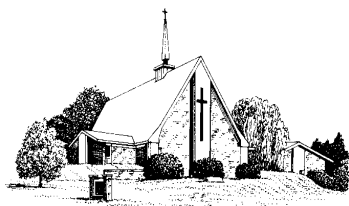

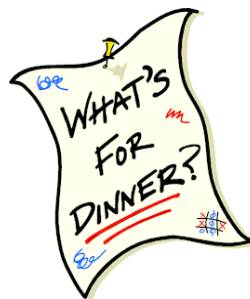
